

ANGLETON, 0117023, Lieutenant Colonel, Corps or ---Police, Headquarters Allied Military Government Fifth Army, for meritorious achievement in connection with military operations in Italy from 15 August 1944 to 26 June 1945. As Lisison Officer between the Office of Strategic Services and the Allied Military Covernment, Fifth Army, Lieutenant Colonel Angleton provided information valuable and necessary to the completion of the mission of the Allied Military Government in Italy. Shortly after the liberation of Rome by the Fifth Army he participated in the discovery and raid on a secret German radio school, capturing highly important German codes, card files and valuable documents which resulted in the arrest of twenty persons who would otherwise have been dangerous to Allied security. He also performed the highly tactful mission of arranging for the guarding and eventual transfer to the Vatican City of Japanese diplomats accredited to the Holy See. With the spring offensive of the Fifth Army in northern Italy, Lieutenant Colonel Angleton proceeded into each newly-captured city, compiling from former business associates valuable and accurate economic intelligence on factories, warehouses, supply dusps and key personnel to be contacted by the military authorities. 

Activities

Colonel Glavin

As member of "S" Force, was in training camp near Caserta TO: for seven days in January 1944.

Was called on "S" Force in May 1944 preparatory to our taking Rome. Embarked on L.S.T. with "S"Force for Anzio and followed into Rome just behind the Vth Army. Certain units of the German Army were still in Rome.

At the suggestion of former agents and acquaintances, I raided Villa Stuart (high up, overlooking Rome) and found there about fifty Italians ranging in age from 19 to 25. They claimed to be Italians from Egypt, Tunis and other places outside of Italian territory bordering the Mediterranean. A German motorcycle (tractor type) was the first thing found which indicated that the Germans had been there. An explosion which I found had been placed in the gears the night before did only minor damage. Further search brought us to a pile of partly burned papers and photographs. In this pile, I found a book containing a cipher written in pencil and several blanks of cipher paper ruled in squares for use in deciphering messages.

We interrogated a number of the Italians and delivered the papers etc. to Major Berding whom I told that I was very the papers of the Villa Stuart was a training place for radio and for agents and probably was used for contacting agents by radio. Upon a subsequent raid on this place, a card file was found which contained names of certain agents whom Counter Espionage had been looking for and some names of agents that had been apprehended.

Eight persons were arrested and later Major Berding informed me that this place probably would be one of the most important places raided in Rome. He was surprised that I had portant it, saying to me: "Jim, how did you find this place since found it, saying to me: "Jim, how did you find this place since it was not on the 'S' Force list?"

On the same morning, we raided another German supply headquarters; to do this, we passed through a line of mortars which were firing over us. On this raid we found German clothing still burning, about 40 German rifles, several spools of wire cable, etc.

From another fire, we recovered photographs of officers' ledgers and papers showing statistics on supply distribution; a box of this material was delivered to Major Berding together with information obtained from Italians interrogated. Lt. Hoff accompanied me on these raids.

TO' : Colonel Glavin

I would be pleased to have a record made for my file that I was on the Anzio beachhead for a period of eight days in January and eight days in February 1944. The first trip was made aboard an "E" boat when Captain Picot took certain agents there.

I was with Captain Croze during the time spent there visiting various units attending liaison and Special Staff meetings each day and keeping in close contact with the CIC.

I assisted in the interrogation of certain agents and escaped prisoners who had passed through the German lines. I interrogated various Italians, among them was Prince Borghese. We were constantly under artillery fire during day and night and various air raids. Some of the most severe fighting took place during these sixteen days - shells fell very close to us on several occasions. One L.S.T. boat on which I returned from my first trip was hit by a shell and set on fire; five men were killed.

We underwent an air raid upon my return from the second trip and one German plane was brought down into the sea by anti-aircraft fire from the L.S.T.

The most important event was helping to take care of Prince Umberto, Lieutenant General of Italy - (Crown Prince).

I had a brass staff made for his flag and two "4-Star plates" for the car. (The stars cut from thick aluminum). I secured a portable generator and mounted it on a jeep trailer and arranged to have electric lights in the part of Palazzo Pitti where he held conferences with various Florentine offi-

I obtained the food that he and 25 guests ate during his stay at the home of Countess Bossi Pucci.

I took him one evening to an ordinance unit (some miles from Florence) for dinner, as he had expressed a desire to have

I stayed on this job which entailed considerable running about in the jeep until we saw him off on his plane.

Practically the same kind of work I did for General Infanti and his wife while they were in Florence.

I also secured from an ordinance unit a 21 ton truck to take his belongings to Rome. General Infanti and family live in the Royal Palace, he being on the Crown Prince's staff.

I met Mr. Myron Taylor and wife at the airport upon their arrival in Florence and delivered a staff car to them for their use during their stay, which was obtained from the Vth Army.

I assisted with the arrangements of the Brazilian Generals during their stay in Florence.

I obtained confidential reports for General Hume on several

individuals that he had requested.

I investigated the transportation problem to ascertain the number of trucks available for food transportation. I investigated the stocks of flour and foodstuffs in warehouses ready for Bologna when liberated and found them to be sufficient for one month's needs. I found that the mill in Florence could produce 100 tons of flour daily, but due to lack of transportation, enough wheat to feed Florence was not coming in. (Daily needs of Florence amount to 80 tons). We succeeded in obtaining additional trucks from ACC at Livorno whereby for the past eight days, we have received daily 100 tons, thereby creating a 20-ton daily surplus for the Florence area. Other foodstuffs were on hand to feed the population during October.

I succeeded, after visiting various ordinance units, in obtaining an M-5 portable generator which I had mounted on a jeep trailer. I obtained 300 feet of rubber covered three phase and two phase cable and superintended the making of a portable and two phase cable and superintended the hight bulbs, lighting system for General Hume. I obtained the light bulbs, connections, extension sockets and had the connections made by connections, extension sockets and had the connections made by a service unit of G-4, Vth Army Rear. This portable set complete is attached to a jeep and can be taken anywhere and installed within a few minutes by any soldier of average intelligence. No wiring or tape required. The use of this is intended for a villa or hotel rooms where there are no lights.

I had a very special type of stove made for General Hume's office and sleeping van which I will not describe here. I shall only say that it required much time to find the various parts only say that it required that the General is very well pleased required. I am glad to say that the General is very well pleased with the stove.

I visited Captain Abrignani's headquarters on two occasions, as well as Captain Cagiati's. I told Captain Cagiati how to go about having his jeep repaired.

I have kept closely in touch with our X-2 unit in Florence.

I have assisted many visitors of various units in obtaining rooms and other needs.

I came to Rome to meet General Hume and have been very busy taking care of his requests there. I have a good day's work in Rome to finish the things he has requested me to do.



- l. Subject officer entered this hospital, 22 March 1945 with a history of a simple fracture of his left tibia and fibula, incurred in a jeep accident near Florence, Italy, 27 October 1944. On admission, he was walking with a long weight bearing caliper and the fractures were climically solid. Flexion of the knee was limited to about 60 degrees. He was given bakes and massage to the knee region. At the time of this admission he was complaining of hoarseness and examination of his larynx showed a small polyp on the right vocal cord. This was removed and microscopic examination showed no evidence of malignancy. He was discharged to duty 4 April 1945.
  - 2. This officer returned to this hospital, 7 June 1945, requesting follow up examination as an out patient. He was walking without a brace but with a rather marked limp. He complained of pain in the left knee and ankle on weight bearing. Examination showed a range of motion of the knee from complete extension to within 20 degrees of complete flexion. There was 1/2 inch atrophy of the lower thigh. The left leg was about 3/4 inch short partially accounting for the limp. The fractures were clinically solid. The left ankle was moderately swollen and in rather severe pronation. Examination of his larynx showed no evidence of recurrence of the polyp removed from his right vocal cord.
    - 3. The following are reports of X-rays taken during his two visits here:

22 March 1945, "There is a complete oblique fracture of the tibia 7" distal to the knee joint, and also a fracture of the fibular neck. These fractures are of about 5 months duration, and there is almost complete union. The general

alignment is satisfactory in both planes. There is still a moderate degree of demineralization, particularly shown in the bone structures about the knee joint."

7 June 1945, "Films of both legs, including the knee joints, demonstrate old well healed fractures of the neck of the fibula and the m/3 of the tibia. The tibial fracture has healed with some shortening, slight anterior bowing, and some resultant demineralization of the large proximal fragment. The bowing, which was previously present, no longer exists to extent observed in the right leg. A spotty demineralization involves the femoral condyle and the patella."



- l. In accordance with your instructions, I spent yesterday, June 3, at the School of Military Government, University of Virginia, Charlottesville. In an extended conversation with Colonel Frank H. Hastings, CAC, Assistant Commandant, it developed that Major Angleton had failed to pass the examination at the end of his four months' course, and for that reason the school was willing to consider his transfer.
  - 2. Colonel Hastings, after obtaining permission from Brigadier General Wickersham, Commandant, told me of Major Angleton's case in detail. He said that he (Colonel Hastings) passed upon Angleton himself when he applied for the school. He was quite impressed with him, his Italian experience, his He was quite impressed with him, his Italian experience, his family and his apparent qualifications. It developed, however, family and his apparent qualifications. It developed, however, that Angleton's Italian was of a poor commercial brand and that the had practically no conversational ability and did not pick he had practically no conversational ability and did not pick it up readily in the Italian classes. 4. Colonel Hastings permitted me to look through the biographies of a number of the graduates and current students of the school, and I saw some who appeared attractive but none who sounded outstanding. However, Colonel Hastings said he would like to confer with the Rating Board of the school which evaluates and assigns the graduates to see if they had any outstanding men who could be loaned to us pending their permanent assignment. I saw no harm in asking him to look for four or five Italian speaking and the same number of French speaking graduates whose qualifications we could consider. I asked him to send these names to you for your consideration and probably for interview. Colonel Hastings was most cooperative and did all in his power to help me with my assignment. He said repeatedly that he had a very high opinion of OSS and seemed most willing to help us.


